There was also a live satellite
demonstration by Clint Bradford,
K6LCS and Gordon West, WB6NOA.
Talking to someone from a repeater
in space - that's a once-in-a-lifetime
opportunity to some people, but for
amateur radio operators today, it is
as common as talking on your cell
phone. Passersby asked what we
were doing. What a perfect

opportunity to promote amateur radio. One of the fair's attendees was W6BP, who didn't know that there was an amateur radio booth inside the building, he recognized Gordon, holding a satellite antenna as being his technician license instructor years ago. Clint was able to make 10 satellite contacts during the short demonstration with an almost overhead satellite pass. Stations from AZ, CO, TX and even a DX contact in Vancouver Canada was made with just 5-watts of power from his handheld transceiver and the AO-51 satellite. Above, Clint displays his gear used for the satellite demonstration outside in the





open fairgrounds. To the left, Clint used an iPod Touch to determine elevation of the satellite passes.

Take a look at the wining booth below. The table displayed literature about amateur radio and how hams are used during emergency crisis. The picture to the left shows how a kid wanting to play with the keys and send his name in Morse code. The pictures show people asking questions and wanting to know more about amateur radio.

AUGUST 21—22, 2010 Southern California Transmitter Hunt

The next Southern California on-foot transmitter hunting session will be another two-day "training camp" at Mt. Pinos in the Los Padres National Forest on the weekend of August 21-22, 2010. It will be especially for members of ARDF Team USA who are in training for the ARDF World Championships in Croatia this September, but it is open to all other radio-orienteers.

These will be advanced courses. You must be capable of walking or running at high elevation for at least 5 kilometers. A ham radio license is not required.

Host and course-setter is Marvin Johnston KE6HTS. His plan is to provide a full 2-meter course Saturday morning, a sprint course Saturday afternoon (where the goal is to catch each transmitter on the next cycle) and a Santa Barbara style tri-tip BBQ supper Saturday evening. Sunday morning's schedule has a full 80-meter course followed by transmitter pickup and departure.

The excellent map of Mt. Pinos by the Los Angeles Orienteering Club will be used. There will be a nominal charge of \$5/day to cover the maps and e-punch equipment. The cost for the optional barbecue will be about \$8 per person.

Orange Section Official Observers Needed

If you are in the Orange Section and would like to become an ARRL Official Observer, you are invited.

The Official Observer program has been sponsored by the American Radio Relay League (ARRL) for more than 50 years to help amateurs help each other. OO appointees have assisted thousands of amateurs to maintain their transmitting equipment and operating procedures in compliance with the regulations. The object of the OO program is to notify amateurs by mail of operating/technical irregularities before they come to the attention of the Federal Communications Commission (FCC).

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The OO performs his function by listening rather than transmitting, keeping an ear out for such things as frequency instability, harmonics, hum, key clicks, broad signals distorted audio, over deviation, out-of-band operations, etc. The OO competes his task once the notification card is sent. In hard-core rule violation cases, OO's refer problems to high echelons of the Amateur Auxiliary, and may be requested to gather evidence for possible FCC enforcement actions.

Requirements:

- 1) Must take and pass an exam to be certified as a member of the Amateur Auxiliary, an FCC requirement, based on study of the ARRL's Amateur Auxiliary Training Manual.
- 2) Must be an ARRL Full Member and have been a licensee of Technician Class or higher for at least 4 years.
- 3) Must report to the OO Coordinator regularly.
- 4) Maintain regular activity in sending out advisory notices as needed. 5 hour min. monthly.

Amateur Radio Field Day Weekend

Huntington Beach Hospital (HBH) June 26-27, 2010





ARRL Field Day is the single most popular on-the-air event held annually in the US and Canada. Each year over 35,000 amateurs gather with their clubs, friends or simply by themselves to operate.

It is a time where many aspects of Amateur Radio come together to highlight our many roles. While some will treat it as a contest, most groups use the opportunity to practice their emergency response capabilities such as the Hospital Disaster Support Communications System (HDSCS). HDSCS is a specialized unit of the Amateur Radio Emergency Service (ARES®) in Orange County, California. ARES is the nationwide public service and emergency communications arm of the American Radio Relay League (ARRL), which is the largest national association of Amateur Radio enthusiasts. It is an excellent opportunity to demonstrate Amateur Radio to local elected community leaders, key individuals with the organizations that Amateur Radio might serve in an emergency, as well as the general public.

All members of HDSCS are FCC-licensed Amateur Radio operators who have their own portable radio equipment ready to respond to nearby hospitals. Member equipment preparedness is vital because almost all HDSCS activations involve backup of communications among units within the hospital facility.

HDSCS stands ready, around the clock, to provide supplemental communications to hospitals in times of disaster or emergencies. Such situations include:

- When a hospital loses its phone system (internal, external, or both) for any
 reason. This happens two to three times a year on average in Orange County, due
 to component failures, electrical surges, or physical damage to lines caused by
 backhoes, etc.
- When the phone systems of hospitals are overwhelmed due to an area-wide emergency.

 In a widespread disaster such as a major earthquake or large-scale flooding, when hospitals need to communicate with each other and outside agencies and when the commercial phone system is unavailable or unreliable. Since HDSCS members automatically activate and respond whenever shaking occurs, they get there quickly and are able to provide the needed assistance.

HDSCS Field Day was operated as a semi-simulated disaster center. The emergency power was used, i.e. generator, the yellow decontamination tents and much more. See below for all the fun had by all at the HDSCS Field Day.
